# Regifting

If it is has been a normal Christmas season, chances are we received a few gifts, that we either can't use, of perhaps aren't our style: a new tie when you have three in the closet that are still packaged; a sweater that is three sizes too big, two sizes too small, or has a design that we would not be caught dead in; a game that is more complicated than our brain can handle, or something to eat, that literally scares us, or is not on our diet. The list goes on...

What do we do? We appreciate the thought, and the person who gave it, but do not see using it, and we don't want to offend the giver. The reality is that some clothes just make it to the deep corners of our closet (after perhaps a token appearance in it). Other items get placed in the "everything" drawer, but some we might regift, and give it to someone who might be able to use it more, or whose "style" better fits the gift.

I admit that I feel a bit uncomfortable in regifting. There is an area, though, where God wants us to become more and more comfortable about regifting. That area is in sharing the good news. Hopefully the good news is not something we see as unusable or not our style. Hopefully we have experienced the joy of it, the immense value of it, and want others to experience it. Paul certainly felt that way when he shared the following.

I Corinthians 9: 19-23 "Though I am free and belong to no one, I have made myself a slave to everyone, to win as many as possible. To the Jews I became like a Jew, to win the Jews. To those under the law I became like one under the law (though I myself am not under the law), so as to win those under the law. To those not having the law, I became like one not having the law (though I am not free from God's law, but am under Christ's law), so as to win those not having the law. To the weak I became weak, to win the weak. I have become all things to all people so that by all possible means, I might save some. I do all this for the sake of the gospel, that I may share in its blessings."

The good news had not changed, but Paul "repackaged" it in a way to that would provide the best chance for others to respond favorably. None of us can perhaps be like Paul, in becoming all things to all people, but a good start is to take inventory of all those God has already brought into our path. A positive approach begins and continues with **prayer**, followed by exercising **care** (listening being one of the best ways to do so, to till the soil of their heart before we **share**.

What would happen if all of us began the process in 2022 by praying for at least one person who does not know Christ? How might the kingdom grow?

# **December Session Notes**

Pastor Roger opened the meeting-thanking Pastor Roundtree and others for helping out while he was ill.

Roger read a passage from the Bible and discussed how to lead when you don't know where you're going. He observed that what worked at Westminster years ago will not work today, that we are in a totally different world.

Session agenda included the following:

- Theogene Havugimana of the Evangelical Global Pentecostal Church in Iowa City discussed why he has requested use of Westminster for his congregation. He wanted a 2-1/2-hour service in the Sanctuary each Sunday, and part of Saturday, too. Theo is a native of Rwanda. He came to US in 2010. He has 3 bachelor degrees and is working on a Master of Divinity. Discussion of his request followed. Session noted that his story was compelling, but due to the timing of the request and commitment to other groups, it voted to deny the request.
- Session voted to begin the process of disposing of the satellite parking lot. Now that Loaves & Fishes has moved, the lot is no longer used by the church.
- Session nominated and approved two new WPC Foundation members: Jan Kosowski and Pam Richardson.
- Goals for Westminster-Session began a discussion of a two-year plan to address various items such as increasing membership, building use and pastor priorities. It was decided to continue this discussion at a later meeting, likely a called or special meeting.

Prior to closing. Session member Barb Read thanked Ann Buckheister for her service on the Session.

The meeting closed with prayer. The next regular Session meeting will be Jan. 18 at 6:30 p.m.

Join us Sunday, Jan. 9, for a presentation by Haji Ali-an update on his water project in Ethiopia. A number of you might recall giving money to his project. You will be amazed at what he's accomplished.



Helping people provide clean water to their villages is something close to Haji's heart. As a child, he often walked at least 20-miles in an effort to get water-not clean water-just water. Sometimes he went home empty-handed. He knows the need. After being adopted by his aunt and uncle, Tamene Gelashe and Shuna Tosa and brought to Cedar Rapids, he was amazed that clean water was just a tap away. Still, he never forgot his own experience. With the knowledge that many still walk miles for even dirty water, he wanted to help.


